This fund update was first made publicly available on 30 June 2019.

What is the purpose of this update?

This document tells you how the Asteron Superplan 2000 European Fund (Fund) has performed and what fees were charged. The document will help you to compare the fund with other funds. Asteron Retirement Investment Limited (ARIL), the Manager and Trustee of Asteron Superplan (Scheme), prepared this update in accordance with the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013. This information is not audited and may be updated.

Description of this fund

This Fund aims to achieve long term growth by focusing on the economics of Europe (excluding UK). This Fund invests either directly or via suitable unit trusts or other funds in shares on the major European Stock Exchanges. The Fund currently utilises a fund offered by an international fund manager.

What are the risks of investing?

The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund's assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way. Specific investment risks

Fund of funds risk

The Fund currently invests in BMO Global Asset Management (BMO) and Nikko Asset Management New Zealand (Nikko) managed funds. The performance of the Fund's investment in BMO and Nikko managed

fund may be affected by unexpected changes in market conditions. This may impact on investors' returns or ability to withdraw from the Fund. To reduce this risk, the Fund's Investment Manager, Suncorp Corporate Services Pty Ltd (SCS), monitors and reviews the investment performance of the BMO and Nikko managed funds against targets and benchmarks on a monthly basis.

Underlying fund investment manager selection risk

The Fund's investment in a BMO or a Nikko managed fund may be subject to the risk that a fund manager selected by BMO and Nikko underperforms, resulting in lower returns than the relevant market indices or investment objectives. To reduce this risk, BMO and Nikko have a thorough manager research and monitoring process and diversify across a number of managers. From a strategic perspective SCS reviews the performance of BMO and Nikko at least every 2 years. Also, SCS have quarterly meetings with BMO and Nikko or more frequently where changes in the business or market environment necessitates.

Service provider risk

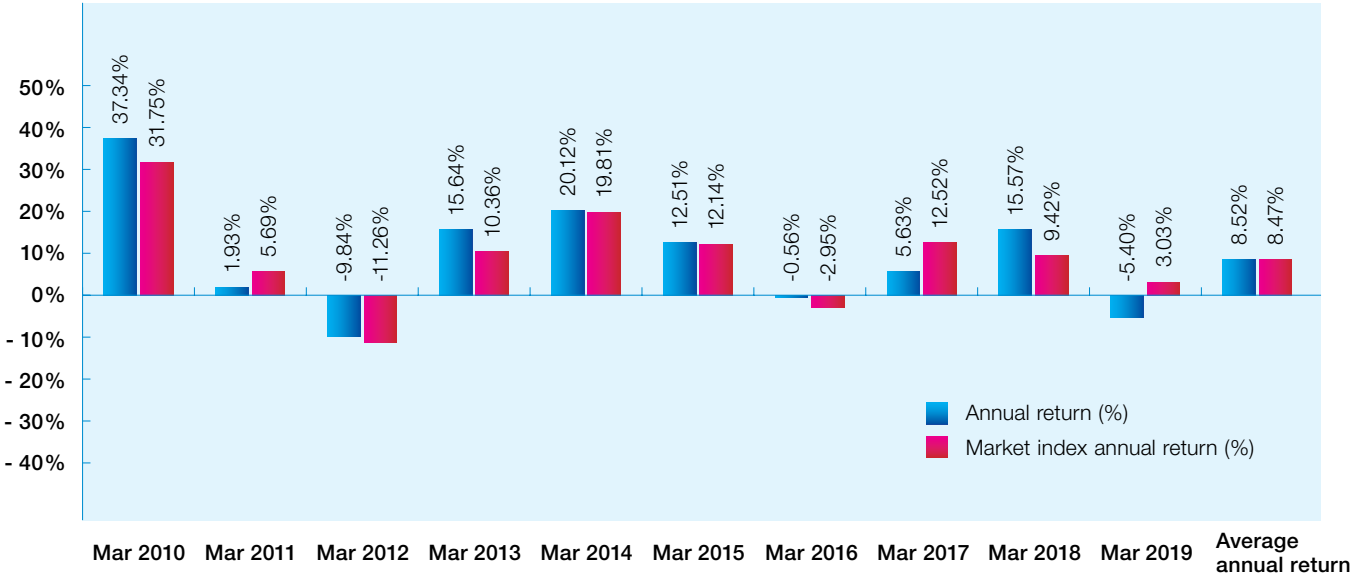
There is a risk that a service provider involved in the investment management and administration of the Fund may breach or fail to perform its obligations. This could impact the operations of the Scheme including the ability to process withdrawals or adversely affect investors' return on investment. From a strategic perspective to reduce this risk, SCS and the Suncorp New Zealand (SNZ) Investment Sub-Committee actively monitor and review the performance of all service providers to ensure compliance with contractual arrangements at a minimum every 2 years. SCS and the SNZ Capital & Investments team have monthly and/or quarterly meetings with service providers or more frequently where changes in the business or market environment necessitates.

How has the fund performed?

Annual return graph



This shows the return after fund charges and tax for each of the last 10 years ending 31 March. The last bar shows the average annual return for the last 10 years up to 31 March 2019.

The graph shows fund returns after the deduction of fees and tax, however, the market index returns are shown before any fees or taxes are deducted.

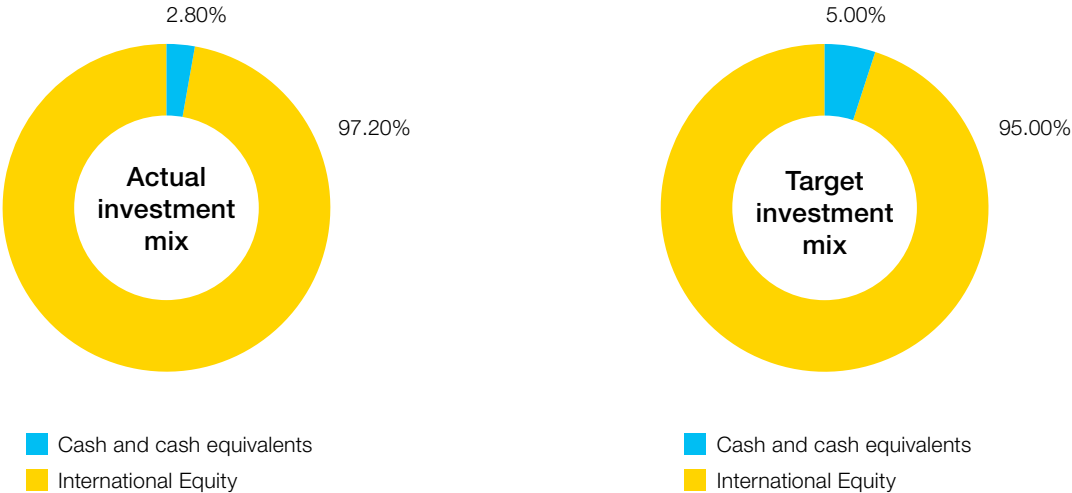
Example of how this applies to an investor

Small differences in fees and charges can have a big impact on your investment over the long term.

David had \$10,000 in the fund at the start of the year and did not make any further contributions. At the end of the year, David received a return after fund charges were deducted of \$-540 (that is -5.4% of his initial \$10,000). David paid no other charges. This gives David a total return after tax of \$-540 for the year.

What does the fund invest in?

Currency Hedging

The currency hedging for the Fund's investment in specialist global equity funds aims to be 25% hedged to the New Zealand Dollar.

Key personnel

ARIL has delegated responsibility for management oversight of the Scheme to Suncorp New Zealand's Chief Executive Officer (CEO). The Suncorp New Zealand CEO is supported to execute this responsibility by the Suncorp New Zealand Asset and Liability Committee and its sub-committees (which includes the Investment Sub-Committee). Notes

1. The Manager receives a basic management fee of 0.7% (before tax) when the Fund's performance is less than or equal to 8.5% p.a. (before tax) of the Fund value, including when the Fund's performance is zero or negative.

The basic management fee is calculated and charged at each daily unit pricing based on the annualised fund price movement since the last pricing.

The Manager's basic fee is net of investment fee rebates and management fee discounts paid to investors through an increase in their individual unit holdings.

2. Other management and administration charges includes allocation of fees to the fund and an estimate of the total expense ratio of the Fund's investment in an underlying managed fund.
3. The Manager is entitled to receive a performance-based fee in respect of the investment performance of the Fund on the following basis.

The performance-based fee is calculated and charged at each daily pricing based on the annualised fund price movement since the last pricing. If the performance of the Fund (the hurdle rate or return) is:

- a. more than 8.5% p.a. (before tax) and less than or equal to 17.0% p.a. (before tax) of the fund value, the fee is 1.4% p.a. (before tax), and
- b. more than 17% p.a. (before tax) of the fund value, the fee is 2.10% p.a. (before tax).

There is no maximum limit on the performance-based fee.

The calculation and payment of the performance-based fee is not subject to a high water mark. A high water mark is the highest value that a fund has achieved on previous performance calculation dates. The effect of no high water mark is that if the Fund drops in value and then recovers, you may be paying a performance-based fee twice for the same return, once for the recovered growth as well as the original growth.

This Fund Update reports the Fund's performance against the market index. The hurdle rate of return used for the determination of the performance-based fee payable is not based on this market index. This may result in a performance-based fee being paid to the Manager even if the Fund's performance does not match or beat the performance of the market index.

4. The top ten investments have been calculated excluding cash and cash equivalents held for operational purposes.
5. Jimmy Higgins was appointed Chief Financial Officer effective 3 June 2019.

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
